Situated in the Sierra Morena in northern Andalusia, the Good Samaritan Rehabilitation Center has an active grove that produces olives.

The organic extra-virgin olive oil produced in this part of Spain is universally recognized as among the best in the world. This is due to the conditions of cultivation, climate and type of tree, and although the production is not abundant, the quality is exceptional.

The olives harvested at the Center are taken to a cooperative to produce olive oil. In 2004, the cooperative received the national prize for its organic production.

If you live in Spain, we will send you a picture and a can of 3 liters of this delicious organic extra-virgin olive oil for an annual donation of 60 euros. If you are in another European Union country, the annual donation is 70 euros.

For any other country in the world, we cannot send the oil, but we can send the picture of the tree you have adopted at the annual donation rate of 70 euros.

With each tree you sponsor, you are impacting the life of a human being, with eternal implications. The sponsoring of a tree can also be an ideal gift for any occasion: Christmas, birthday, anniversary, wedding, or just a gift for someone you care about.

100% of the proceeds from the olive tree adoptions is destined to investing in the lives of the men going through the program.

We encourage you to visit us and participate as a volunteer at the Center. If you come in the spring, you can clean and prepare the base of the trees for the harvest, and if you come between November and January, you can participate in the harvest! Take the challenge!











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
